## FIFTEENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

None of us were aware we were speaking prose all those years before we learned of the term "prose," but we were then shocked at our ability! Similarly, we long take for granted the remarkable resources provided us by being members of the Catholic Church, but then come at last to marvel at what a patrimony and treasure has been bestowed upon us.

The lives of the saints provide a cavalcade of ways to live, varied callings to devote ourselves to, original spiritualities for our devotion and use. I often recommend to students the Office of Readings of the Liturgy of the Hours to introduce them each day to the genius of one of the fathers of the Church, hitherto unglimped. As our Chapel of the Women Doctors of the Church here at St Pauls reminds us, the lives, spirituality and teaching of the doctors of the church deepen our understanding of the Faith. So does the art of the Church! Paintings, sculptures and stained-glass windows of churches (now found in museums as well) lift our hearts to Heaven and remind us of God's work in history, of Christ's life and teaching, of saints who reached out - and still reach out - to evangelize us all. Religious orders and institutes capture our wish to understand the treasures of the Christian faith more deeply and share it with others in ingenious ways. Catholic colleges, universities, seminaries and schools at every level are an incomparable resource around the world.

Besides the Pontifical Academies of Sciences, of Social Sciences and of Life, we are all familiar with local diocesan guilds of Catholic physicians and Catholic lawyers who gather for studies, speakers and public Mass.

The Harvard Catholic Forum and Lumen Christi of the University of Chicago have joined here this week to offer a remarkable seminar on science and religion provided by members of the Society of Catholic Scientists. As our local lawyers sponsor an annual Red Mass and our area physicians a White Mass, so scientists in many regions have gathered for a Gold Mass sponsored by the Society.

The Society of Catholic Scientists is an international organization that fosters fellowship among Catholic scientists and witnesses in the world to the harmony of faith and reason. The Society directly intends to be a resource to those attempting to integrate the worlds of science and religion in their own intellectual and spiritual lives. It provides a forum for reflection on and discussion of the relation of science and the Catholic faith. Thus it is a resource for the Church, for us, for Catholic educators, pastors and lay people, for journalists, writers, pundits and the general public who have questions about the significance of scientific theories and discoveries as they relate to the faith and to the church.

Please avail yourself of this magnificent resource! Please be sure to investigate its excellent website, [catholicscientists.org](http://catholicscientists.org) which includes answers to questions that so many Catholics still puzzle over in this area when left only to their individual thoughts, without using the great resources of the Catholic Church, which has been termed the largest and longest-term patron of science in history.

Be sure to investigate "Common Questions" on the Society's superb website for a brilliant and informed treatment of, say, Evolution. "The Catholic Church has repeatedly made clear that evolution is compatible with Christian belief," quoting Popes Benedict XVI and St. John Paul II. "The Catholic Church never at any time condemned the theory of evolution."

I suppose that all of us know that the science of genetics was first explored, demonstrated and founded by an Augustinian priest and abbot, Gregor Mendel. Not all are aware that the Big Bang was first proposed and elucidated by a Belgian priest, Abbé Georges Lemaître. Do Google him to see photos of him with Einstein who felt Lemaître provided the best mathematical treatment of his theory of General Relativity.

Do look through the Common Questions on the website, such as:

Q2 "Doesn't Evolution show that a "Creator" is not needed?"

Q4. "Doesn't the Book of Genesis contradict the Big Bang and Evolution?"

Q10. "Hasn't the Catholic Church historically been opposed to science (e.g., Galileo)?"

How important to share our gifts with others! Solidarity is the gift the world needs most now. The Society of Catholic Scientists shows what a contribution such an informed group can make! Please do apply for membership (on their website). Let us get a chapter fully established here!
